A Word from the Chairman of the Board of Trustees

Dear Alumni, Parents, and friends of the Academy:

Dr. /Col Jim Benson, USMC (Ret) turns over the reins of Howe Military Academy to Dr. /COL Tom Tate, USA (Ret) on July 1, 2018.

After five months, at the helm of the Academy and during possibly the most crucial period in the school's history, Col Benson passed the baton to his own hand-selected Commandant, COL Tom Tate. Subsequent to consulting with the Board of Trustees during the fall and winter of 2017, the Board asked

Col Benson to assume the position of Superintendent. In an open-ended contract, Col Benson agreed to lead the Academy until such time as the Academy had turned the corner from an educational, financial, and military standpoint; seek to improve the Academy staff and teaching faculty to the extent required; and advise the Board relative to a candidate to become the next Superintendent.

Upon Col Benson's recommendation and on June 21, 2018 the Board voted to name COL Tom Tate as the next head of school and to change the title from Superintendent to President/CEO. COL Tate, a decorated Army Special Forces Officer and a leader/scholar with a doctorate in Higher Education Administration from the University of Alabama, brings a wealth of experience to HMA. Prior to joining the Academy as Commandant of the HMA cadets in February, 2018, COL Tate served four years as the Professor of Military Science at the Florida Institute of Technology, Vice President for Student Affairs

and Commandant of Cadets at Marion Military Institute, and Director of the Center for Leadership and Career Development at Marion Military Institute.

Col Benson and COL Tate are of like mind relative to the education and development of our youth through the military model of college preparatory school education. The Board is confident of the continuity between Col Benson and COL Tate and excited about Howe's future. HMA appears to be on solid footing for the 2018/2019 school year as evidenced by the anticipated high retention rate of current cadets and the unprecedented number of incoming inquiries and applications.

Finally, the Board, staff and faculty, parents, and alumni thank Col Benson for his leadership, dedication, and inspirational contributions to the longevity of this Academy. Moreover, we wish him all the best in his consulting business and publication of his new book, titled "Executive Courage - Sometimes You Have to Walk Point."

The 2017-2018 school year ended on June 2, 2018 with the final parade and the eighth grade completion and senior graduation ceremonies, which were held in Bouton Auditorium. All ten seniors that graduated will be attending either a technical/community college or a four-year college/university in the fall. The Academy has hired four new instructors for the 2018-2019 school year to teach Spanish, English 9 and 12, Chemistry/Math, and Art/P.E./Journalism. I will be stepping down as the Dean of Academics in June to return to the classroom full time this fall, where my real passion lies. I am pleased to introduce Theresa Jacobs, who will be taking over the position of Dean of Academics.

Theresa Jacobs earned her Bachelor of Science in Secondary Social Studies Education and History in 2002 from Defiance College, in Defiance, Ohio, and continued her educational goals at Defiance College by completing her Master of Arts in Education with a focus on Curriculum and Instruction in 2004. In 2012, Ms. Jacobs completed the Principal Leadership Program through Indiana Wesleyan University located in Marion, Indiana. In 2018, Ms. Jacobs earned both her Educational Specialist degree from Northcentral University, Prescott Valley, Arizona and the Doctorate of Education (all but dissertation) in Curriculum and Teaching.

Ms. Jacobs served as the Director of Alternative Education at Tri-Creek School Corporation, located in Lowell, Indiana, from 2005 – 2014. During her tenure at Tri-Creek School Corporation, Ms. Jacobs developed an alternative

education program to meet the needs of academically at-risk students, a credit recovery program to maintain graduation rates, and developed and implemented a Data War Room with structured data teams to provide a true Response to an Intervention Program to meet the needs of all students.

While at Campagna Academy, Ms. Jacobs developed a Day Treatment Program that serviced at-risk juveniles in Lake County, Indiana. The program focused on Dialetical Behavior Therapy and educational services to help re-integrate that targeted population back into their communities. Ms. Jacobs served as a member of the Alternatives to Detention Program and developed the first Evening Reporting Program in Lake County to provide additional services for at-risk juvenile offenders.

Theresa is excited to begin this new journey and looks forward to taking Howe's academic department to the next level.




Roman Lynch '68 carries the flag while Neal Ehrlich '68 salutes as they lead the group of various alumni across the Parade Field.

HMA Character and Leadership Lecture Series Wrap-Up

Continuing in the spirit of inspiration and motivation, eight speakers have addressed the cadets, faculty, and staff of Howe Military Academy during the bi-weekly Character and Leadership Lecture Series that Col Jim Benson began in February 2018.

The 2017-2018 academic year came to a close with cadets hearing the words of the following speakers during the month of May:

- · Congressman Jim Banks, Rep. from the 3rd District of Indiana;
- Raymond Rottman, Colonel USAF (Ret) and Executive Director of the Association of Military Colleges and Schools of the United States.; and
- Alumnus, Ford S. Braun '79, commercial airline pilot for JetBlue.

Congressman Banks' speech emphasized public service. "Leadership is public service – you must serve others," Banks said. He encouraged the cadets to aspire to be public servants and serve the public in significant ways. Public servants, he said, include teachers, government officials, and peace officers.

On May 16th, Col Rottman spoke of a poem titled "The Dash" by Linda Ellis which emphasizes the line on a tombstone that is placed between the date of birth and the date of death. The line represents the life that was lived. "Live today to build your dash and make it significant," Rottman said.

Braun '79 demonstrated to the cadets the HMA tie pin that he received from Howe Military Academy. He proudly wears the HMA tie pin every day he's at work and has so for the past 34 years, he said.

In his remarks, Braun told those present that as a cadet at HMA, he had been taught the acronym GODF which stands for Grounded, Organized, Disciplined and Focused. He described each principal in detail, telling cadets:

- Grounded = Have faith, help others, lead with honor
- Organized = Set realistic goals, have a plan
- Disciplined = Don't get distracted, stay out of trouble
- Focused = Expect change, never give up

"GODF made me who I am. It has been critical to my success," Braun said.

The Leadership Lecture Series will continue in the fall as the 2018-2019 academic year begins. Upon completion of each lecture, the Corps passes in review to honor the speaker. 

Generous Donations Reach \$75,000 to Make New Weight Room/Fitness Center a Reality







HMA parents and alumni have come together once again, this time to oversee the fulfillment of a state of the art weight-training and fitness facility.

David Hackett '51 and his wife, Krystyna, responded to the need outlined in an address by Col Jim Benson speaking to the benefits of sound body and sound mind. The Hacketts demonstrate a tradition of annual gifting to various institutions and decided to focus this year's gift on the new HMA weight room/fitness center, providing just over \$60,000 towards its creation. "I think that the weight room can have a positive impact on the cadets from a health standpoint and their self-esteem," Hackett '51 said.

In addition, three HMA families each contributed a \$5,000 monetary gift, allowing the cadets at Howe the privilege of utilizing a new, \$75,000 weight room/fitness center complete with top-of-the-line equipment. Additionally, **David and Traci Tate** are dedicating their professional insight as owners of **Elite FTS**, **Inc.**, to guide the design and implementation of not only the center itself, but also the top-of-the-line fitness and weight training equipment within.

The new weight room will be located on the main floor of the Lower School Gymnasium. Construction begins this month with a completion deadline set in time for cadets to utilize its full benefits this fall.

Teacher of the Year - Ms. Olga Brezden



Charles Bishop Receives Honor



New Metal Roof on the Paul E. Burns President's Quarters




