A Well-deserved Promotion Meet the New BC

Cadet Marie Savage wins the following awards for the 2002 school year:

National Honor Society Certificate — Candidates are selected from the junior and senior classes and may qualify for membership with a 3.0 cumulative GPA and must also be outstanding in leadership, service, scholarship, and character.

Frances M. Howe Medal for Christian Courtesy — Presented to the junior cadet who demonstrated the most Christian courtesy throughout his or her tenure at Howe. Major Merritt Sword & Medal — Presented to the most outstanding non-commissioned officer of the Howe Military School cadet corps. Selection is based on morale and military, academic, athletic and all other school activities.

John A. Pagin Economics Award — Recipients of these medals excelled in college level economics, were aware of problems inherent in major economic systems, exhibited an abiding curiosity for the discipline of economics, and were able to write essays on all aspects of current economic dilemmas.

Academic Excellence Award — This program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education and recognizes and honors students who have achieved high academic goals by their hard work and dedication to learning. Cadets must maintain a required GPA and have test scores within established percentile levels as set forth by the National Association of Secondary School Principals to be eligible for one of two honors: the President's Award for Educational Excellence or the President's Award for Educational Achievement.

Outstanding Non-Commissioned Officer Medal — Presented to the outstanding non-commissioned officer of the cadet corps.

Cadet Savage was also named to the Superintendent's List six times during the 2002-03 school year.

Marie Savage is the daughter of William and Chung Mei Savage of Howe. She has been attending Howe Military School since August 1999. Her sister, Su-Mei, graduated from Howe in 2002 and her brother, Tony, will be a sophomore in August.

ow About Howe"? That was the first thing I heard about Howe Military School when I was twelve years old and in seventh grade. I toured the school three times before I attended, and finally decided to start my second semester in February of 1998. I had always been in small Catholic schools before, so Howe was a significant change for me, especially because the age range was so different from what I was used to. Six years is a long time...about half of my childhood. That is how long I have been a cadet at Howe Military School.

The lessons that Howe helped me learn are priceless. The memories are endless, and the friendships are something that will last until the end of time. All of the staff members are extremely professional when it comes to dealing with children or young adults. As soon as I arrived, I felt incredibly welcome and respected.

Attending Howe as a girl is different from a boy's experience. The number of girls in Alpha Company has varied throughout the years, the most being in the high thirties and the least being in the twenties. I am not going to say that it is easy living with a bunch of girls, but in the end it all works out very nicely. Living with all of them has taught me many things, such as learning how to make lasting friendships, dealing with bickering, standing up for myself, and speaking my opinions respectfully.

This coming year will be my final year at Howe; and while I will miss being there every day, I will always know that I have a "home away from home". Being there for so long showed me how people can act, deal, and react to certain things. The teachers have wonderful relationships with students...many of them are more than teachers to most students. They are compassionate and understanding, yet firm mentors. The teachers at Howe are genuine and care about the school.

Over the years I have held many leadership positions, but I am most excited about the upcoming year because my best friend, Marie Savage, and I are going to be making history. She is the first female Battalion Commander, and I will be her trustworthy right hand, the Battalion Executive Officer. This makes the first time that two females have been the top officers. I am filled with the utmost excitement, and am pleased that we could both achieve these positions. We are the leaders of the school who



must show everyone what Howe is about.

Howe's sports and clubs programs are extensive. Being involved in every club and sport that I can is tiring, but at the same time it is too much fun

Although our sports teams may not win every time, we still have the heart to win and the toughness to stick it out until the end of the game. Clubs are also fun, and all of the cadets on campus are in something called a "CAP Group". These groups are led by teachers or other staff members who take

their group out for fun (usually off-campus) to a pizza place, bowling alley, etc. Howe keeps everyone busy, which is one of the things I like most.



The alumni of Howe mean a great deal to me. They have gone through the same things we have, and know what Howe is all about. These are some of the people I have the most respect for, because they simply understand how you feel and have been in your "place". About 97% of all Howe graduates go on to college, and it is a well-known fact that most of the older alumni have been successful business people who are also the core support of the school.

Howe is everything to me, and it has taught me a great deal. I have briefly explained to you why I love Howe and what it has done for me; and with these words, I can only hope that you understand the extensiveness of what Howe means to me. I hope I have emphasized to you, not only the importance of a well-balanced education and learning experience, but what it means when you receive that very thing.

Take the Challenge

An equal chance for young women at HMS

The term, "separate, but equal", does not apply to Howe Military School. Since the addition of females in 1988, we have provided a fully integrated, truly co-educational experience. Without losing traditions that have withstood the test of time, Howe has successfully developed a curriculum that can benefit every cadet, male or female.

At HMS, a girl is not judged by what she wears or her connections. Rather, she is given the opportunity to advance on the basis of her talents, strengths and effort. What can a young woman gain from attending Howe Military School - a genuinely unique educational experience, in which we develop the whole person – mentally, physically and spiritually. If she applies herself in our program, she can become more mature, responsible and self-motivated. She can be instilled with a sense of honor and pride. In a learning environment that extends far beyond the classroom, a female cadet can reach heights she never thought possible.

Unlocking her potential

You know she has the ability for a promising and bright future. The determination for personal excellence and achievement has to come from the cadet – and we can help her develop the path to success.

At HMS, we teach a cadet to be an individual first and foremost, while never losing the sense of esprit de corps she feels from being part of the cadet battalion. Being a cadet does not mean being a tomboy - we do not want a female cadet to compromise her femininity, but rather become a self-reliant woman. She is given the same opportunity as the male cadets, and with equal opportunity comes equal expectations. We expect all of our cadets to live up to high ideals. If we demand certain standards from our students, their performance can rise to the challenge, and in turn they can learn to expect greater things of themselves.

Academics — A solid college preparatory education is the most important aspect of our program. In both the lower and upper schools, we prepare our students to pursue higher education by stressing traditional study methods and "getting back to basics" academically. From our small class sizes to our advanced computer technology, a student



will be provided with a strong academic background that can serve as a foundation for learning the rest of her life.

Character — At Howe, we train students, not soldiers. Our structured and disciplined program encompasses several essential areas of development for any young adult, including time management, organizational skills, and co-operation. The JROTC program is a catalyst by which we teach our cadets these important traits. We



teach cadets to face each day with newfound self-confidence and take on every challenge with an inner motivation that knows no bounds.

Leadership — Leaders aren't born, they're made. At HMS, we provide the tools necessary for a girl to become a successful leader. At first, a new cadet is a follower, learning her role as part of a team. With time and

experience, she can take on additional responsibilities and leadership positions. She can learn that leadership is not about just giving orders, but rather an opportunity to lead by example, tending to the needs and concerns of subordinates, while keeping the greater task at hand in mind.

Athletics - Physical activity is an integral part of any complete education. Through athletics, female cadets can not only become physically fit, but gain an invaluable sense of self-esteem and teamwork. Cadets are required to participate in two sports each year. For girls, we offer varsity volleyball, basketball, cheerleading, softball and tennis. Co-educational participation is also available in cross country, swimming, track and field, rifle, golf and soccer.

The time is now

There will never be a better time than right now. The quest for a quality education has become increasingly prominent and exceedingly important. At Howe, we've been answering that call for over 118 years, providing a fundamentally sound program that can prepare a young woman not only for college, but for the rest of her life.

Every day she will be challenged, and she'll find out just how far she can go. The word, "can't", will disappear and she will know that with proper self-motivation, anything is possible.

A time of pride and achievements

itting the beaches was far from the minds of the class of 2003 as they lined up for the processional into Bouton Auditorium. It may have been a rainy day, but the spirits of twenty-five seniors were not dampened by a black sky.

Salutatorian, Diana Richardson, and valedictorian, Aaliyah McNary, gave heartwarming speeches that left very few, if any, dry eyes. Diana began her address by saying she didn't know what was expected in a speech like this, so she would just talk. She continued with, "all that comes to mind are feelings of fear, ambition,



apprehension, bliss; you name it and I'm feeling it. How can I write a speech that includes every moment, every emotion, and

everything that this school has done for me, or even at times taken away?"

Diana stated that she did not expect to be at Howe for as long as she had. Hoping her first year would be her last, she tried to weasel her way back home every chance she got. Almost any teacher at Howe could attest to the fact that before every break they would hear her say, "I won't be coming back!" However, she came to appreciate the place that she never wanted to be at in the first place. Howe made her appreciate the concept of a home and brought out qualities in her that she didn't think would be there until later in life.

Diana was not afraid to admit that she was diagnosed with depression a year earlier and that she was bipolar. Although she can never fully rid herself of something like this, she now has more control of the situation than she did before. Diana shared this information, not for pity, for she knows she is far from alone when it comes to this disease; but to let everyone know that when you have the right surroundings it is possible to jump any hurdle. She thanked everyone for their support through some difficult times. "If it wasn't for the support of many, I would not be standing here in front of you today", said Diana.

Let us do this together

Having sat though three, previous graduation ceremonies, valedictorian, Aaliyah McNary, told herself that if she ever had the opportunity to be up on this stage to speak, she would know exactly what to say. She found the words did not flow as easily as she thought they would.

Aaliyah acknowledged that many here had helped her in some way to get to this milestone in her life. "My family, especially my parents, has always been my support. They taught me that no matter what, I will always have someone there who believes in me, someone to care, someone to push me in the right direction. Without your love and your support, I do not think I would be standing here today. My teachers have taught me how to learn, excel, and strive to be whatever I want to be. I learned quickly that I could not get very far with crocodile tears or the flash of a smile. It is you who taught me to strive to be the best. You taught me to keep my head up high and be proud of my accomplishments. You taught me how to look in the mirror and love what I see. You taught me to never be ashamed. My friends, my peers - I say that it is you who have taught me the most. You taught me how to love and that it is just not worth my time to hate. You showed me how to laugh and have a good time and taught me that I do not always have to be so serious. I do not think that I have stopped smiling since. You made me realize that no matter how great a person I am, not everyone is going to like me; and, now I know, that is really okay. From you I learned how to find the good in every bad. I learned how to trust and what to do when someone lets me down. I know now how to pick my battles. Not everything is worth my tears. Thank you, all of you."

Aaliyah reminded the underclassmen of one thing.

Cherish every moment you have. Do not even waste one. You will never find the lasting friendships that you have gained here, anywhere else. You will be able to do so much if you allow Howe to help you help yourself. These are the good old days that you are going to miss. Please don't be foolish. There are empty seats that are no longer reserved for members of our class who allowed foolishness to fill their



lives with regret. Use us as your example. Use judgment to choose the path that will lead you to success.

Orrin Hatch once said, "There is a good reason they call these ceremonies 'commencement exercises'. Graduation is not the end; it's the beginning." Today, when we walk across the stage, we are walking into the beginning of the rest of our lives. I know that you are just as scared as you are excited; because believe me, I feel the same way. Yes, today I will graduate from high school-but not just me-WE-we will graduate from high school. We have lived together, played together, laughed together, and cried together. Now has come the time for us to graduate. So let us do this - together.

Larger Lessons of Life

G ood discipline contains a boy and his energy, providing the sense of physical and emotional security he needs in order to learn the larger lessons of self-control and moral behavior...Good discipline engages a child, encourages contact instead of isolation, draws him into discussion, instead of sending him away."

This is a passage from the landmark book Raising Cain: Protecting the Emotional life of Boys by Drs. Dan Kindlon and Michael Thompson. After more than a quarter of a century working with young people and their parents, these two, nationally recognized psychologists have produced a piece that I think really breaks through to the most inner struggles of today's youth, boys and girls.

As I recently read this book, I was repeatedly reminded of ways that Howe Military School reaches into the lives and minds of young people. Since 1884, Howe's private, boarding, military approach in working with youth has done just this. Through our structured program and daily regimen, I believe we successfully contain their youthful energy and provide security for our students to prepare for college. Kindlon and Thompson describe this as learning the "larger lessons of self-control and moral behavior". Not a day passes at Howe when our cadets are not engaged in the lessons of their own discipline. Through the consistent guidance of our rules and regulations, under the patient guidance of our faculty and staff, Howe students internalize discipline for life. Regular worship and spiritual teaching strongly internalizes moral standards.

Howe's enrollment for the 2002 school year increased over last year. Two hundred twenty-two students attended Howe this year, representing a 4% increase over last year. Our retention of former students significantly improved this year. I believe our enrollment increases reflect Howe's commitment to a program that does internalize the "larger lessons" of life. Howe engages our students in the lessons they so desperately need in a world committed to moral relativism.

Since our founding in 1884, our global society has experienced a widespread, fundamental revolution in worldview. Though the stressors on youth and families have changed in nature and intensity, the inner lives of young people remain the same. Ask any Howe graduate of any class and I believe they will tell you that Howe gave them the security and guidance to be engaged in the tough lessons of self-discipline and morality. That is why Howe Military School is growing today. Like the above passage from Kindlon and Thompson, Howe's procedures for guiding kids engages young people—not isolates them. As an independent school, Howe is free to encourage the kind of spiritual and moral development that tax-supported schools are prohibited from doing.

How many American schools today actually engage their students in the larger lessons of self-control and morality? How many families with whom you have contact are desperately in need of the kind of education Howe provides?

As an ambassador for Howe Military School, I encourage you to tell others what Howe has meant to you. Encourage parents to call Admissions and schedule a campus visit. Urge them to meet our Admissions' staff when we are in your local area to meet families; better yet, offer to bring them to an Admissions reception. Never in any other period of time has youth more seriously needed the guiding hand of adults, partnering with educators in enabling students to internalize the "larger lessons" of life.

In a time when parents are seriously looking for schools that will engage their children in a quality, college preparatory education, Howe Military School stands as a model in addressing the needs of kids today.



Another school year has come and gone, and I am pleased with the successes accomplished by our cadets, faculty, and staff. There have been a few bumps along the way, but everyone managed to work their way through those not so easy to deal with at times. You can "hold your heads high." I salute all of you for your untiring efforts to make Howe Military School what it is today. Let's do it for another 118 years!



We are already working diligently in preparation for the upcoming school year. I feel confident that next year will be as successful for cadets as was this last. In my last report, I mentioned that the cadets got off to a good start for the first six weeks of the first semester. The overall grade point average for the first six weeks of this semester was 2.824, an outstanding effort. I do not recall during my tenure at HMS any initial grade point average being higher. Obviously, there is hope that overall grade point averages will improve, but sometimes that does not happen. Well, the cadets continued to achieve during the year, and they finished the final six weeks of the school year with an overall 2.841 grade point average and a 2.802 grade point average for the second semester. Again, I offer my congratulations to cadets, as well as faculty and staff who made that possible.

I am pleased to note that 50% of the cadets made honor grades for the last grading period, meaning that they had to achieve at least a 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. That percentage has been fairly typical throughout the year. I am also pleased to note another outstanding accomplishment related to the President's Education Award. This award is based on standardized test scores, as well as overall grade point averages, and is presented to cadets at the commencement ceremony over graduation weekend who meet stringent criteria. Cadets must maintain a required GPA and have test scores within established percentile levels as set forth by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. Ordinarily, only four or five cadets meet the criteria. On May 31, 2003, thirty-five cadets received the President's Education Award for academic achievement and excellence.

During the commencement exercises, Diana Richardson, salutatorian, and Aaliyah McNary, valedictorian, gave their commencement speeches. I can honestly say that I have never been more moved by any such addresses.

Both cadets addressed what HMS is all about and what it has meant to them. The Class of 2003 is to be commended. I wish you all my best as you pursue your dreams. No doubt, they will be achieved.

Finally, once again I cannot thank cadets, faculty, and staff enough for making this past year one of my most enjoyable and memorable. Everyone, have a great summer; and I look forward to seeing you in late August, as we embark on what I hope will be an even more productive year for our cadets, faculty, and staff.



The school itself was founded in 1884, but one of its first buildings was constructed in 1875. This building served eventually as the Superintendent's home, the Administration Building, and now as a museum and repository for historical materials.

It is open to the public by appointment. Be prepared to walk back into the past - through high teas, battlefield helmets, and a library of old books.

Another Golden Moment James D. Weiss '53.....Alumnus of the Year

The most prestigious award the Alumni Association presents each year is our Alumnus of the Year award. The criteria necessary for being named Alumnus of the Year is to be a reflection of the Howe Alumni Association's mission statement. This award recognizes an alumnus whose career achievements and service to Howe have been exemplary. A formal picture of the honoree will be placed in the Major Merritt Dining Hall for the next year. His name will also be

placed on a permanent plaque, which is also in the dining hall. James D. Weiss, Class of 1953, humbly accepted this award.

James, or Jim as most refer to him, came to Howe Military School as a camper for five years and as a cadet for four years. While at Howe, he was one of the very few who participated in and lettered in four sports. They were track, basketball, baseball, and he served as captain for the cross country team. Jim received the NFL Degree of Honor, and, he qualified as an expert rifleman for three years. He was a member of the Varsity H Club, the Old Guard, and won the county ping-pong singles and doubles championship.

Following graduation from HMS Jim attended Wayne State University where he received his BA in business management in 1957. While a student at Wayne State, he was chosen to be a student intern assistant to Walter Ruether, president of the AFL-CIO. Jim then attended Indiana University where he graduated with an MBA in finance in 1959 and served as Vice President of Delta Chi fraternity. Having been identified as an individual who was both highly personable and capable of administrative affairs Jim was hired as a personal assistant to Eli Lilly...not Eli Lilly the corporation but Eli Lilly the man who founded and served as the long term chairman of Eli Lilly Corporation. So impressed was Mr. Lilly with Jim's talent that he insisted on sending him to the Indiana University School of Law.

Jim has had an outstanding professional career; having worked for Charles Pfizer & Company, Bache & Company, E.F. Hutton, and Kemper Securities. While at Pfizer & Company, he was named salesman of the quarter several times and salesman of the year in 1966. He also taught personal finance and salesmanship at the University of Toledo. In 1973 he formed his own company, specializing in real estate development and leasing, with an emphasis on tax planning. Jim has been a member of the NYSE, NASD and was a licensed commodity broker. He has also served on the Board of Advisors for Century Bank and Trust, is a director for Southern Michigan Bancorp and has been a member of the Rotary Club, and the American Management Association.

Thirty-six years after his own graduation, Jim was proud to have his son, James, graduate from Howe in 1989.

Jim has served on the Alumni Board for over 30 years, having served as president in 1971. He also served on the school's Board of Trustees for five years. He was named Distinguished Alumnus in 1984-85 and was named a Hero in Education in

2002. He opened the Alumni Club in Sturgis, MI in 2002, as a permanent home for the Howe Military School Alumni Weekend hospitalities.

We believe that Jim's achievements, leadership and service certainly prove that he is well deserving of the Alumnus of the Year award. He has been recognized as a consistent donor through his membership in the Herrick Fellow Society and John B. Howe Society. He places a special emphasis on scholarships and wishes for Howe to maintain its status as a first rate school, helping young people to have the opportunity to be prepared for college through the Howe experience. He believes that Howe Military School will instill in them the fundamentals of leadership and enable them to become the type of citizens of which our school and nation can be proud.

Proud of a True Hero

Lt. Col. J. Thomas Pearlman '51 recognized

n October 11, 2002, while Tom Pearlman was in Texas with his wife, Janice, for her high school reunion, he was presented with Proclamation No. 1140 from the Texas Senate. He was recognized for his dedication to his country and his outstanding military service. At the same time, he received a Texas state flag (the Lone Star flag) that was flown over the state capitol on July 4, 2002.

The proclamation, signed by Eddie Lucio, Jr., member of the Texas Senate, reads in part:

"Whereas the regular infantry officer and master army aviator, Col. Pearlman served his country with valor in Vietnam and in Korea and received numerous decorations during the course of his distinguished career. West Texas Military Institute and the U.S. Military Academy. To be eligible for the award, the nominee must be the most soldierly cadet considering academics, athletics and leadership.

Bishop Gray Saber & Bouton Memorial Plaque – This award is presented to the senior who has made the greatest overall achievement in school activities during their years at Howe Military School.

Commander of the Old Guard Plaque – The Howe plaque is awarded to cadets who attend Howe Military School for eight years.

Academic Achievement Award – This program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education and recognizes and honors students who have achieved high academic goals through their hard work and dedication to learning. Cadets must maintain a required GPA and have test scores within established percentile levels, as set forth by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, to be eligible for one of two honors: the President's Award for Educational Excellence or the President's Award for Educational Achievement.

National Honor Society Honor Chord – Chords are awarded to the seniors who are graduating in good standing from the National Honor Society.

Phil is the son of Lisabeth Vernier of Rochester Hills, MI and Paul Vernier of Eastpointe, MI. He was named to the Headmaster's List four times and the Superintendent's List one time during his senior year. He plans to attend Oakland University where he will major in law, and minor in engineering or psychology. Howe Military School wishes him the very best on his accomplishments, not only during this past year but all eight years at HMS. Welcome to the Alumni Association!

He was awarded the Bronze Star medal, the Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Army Commendation medal, the Meritorious Service medal, and the Legion of Merit. He was also awarded 28 air medals."

The proclamation goes on to say that Tom volunteered three times to serve in Vietnam and was shot down three times. He received the Purple Heart and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry.

"Whereas Col. Pearlman is noted for his integrity, leadership and courage, and his outstanding military career is a testament to his patriotism and his commitment to his fellow man..." the proclamation continues.

"I never knew they were going to do this," Tom said. "The State of Texas doesn't do this kind of thing, and this just blows you away!"






