The Howe Summer Camp, June 30 - August 10, 1968, offers your boy one of the happiest vacations as a member of the selected group of one hundred fifty boys, who like himself, are full of vitality and are keen about the out-of-doors. It provides a well-balanced, attractive program under the guidance of mature, capable men.

A happy vacation is not contradictory to a profitable, purposeful summer. Merely to loaf at home or to spend the weeks at a summer resort with the family, is not the most profitable use of the summer months for youth.

The Howe Summer Camp provides six weeks of constructive good times with fine fellowship and happy memories. More important, however, it offers a life free from the nervous tension of the city. Vacation should mean more than free time to a growing boy. To organize this extra free time wisely in the city is difficult. Camp provides a setting wherein nerve reserve is built, experience under wise leadership is gained and broad associations made through a carefully organized program.

All buildings are screened and floored and are well-lighted by electricity. Mattresses and furniture are supplied from the dormitories of the winter school.

Military training is a part of the regular life of the Camp. The drill period is held at a time of day when the air is cool. Military courtesy, prompt attention to orders and essentials necessary for leadership are stressed. Military training in the Summer Camp comes from a firm conviction that now, as never before, self-discipline must be taught our younger generation. A competent, experienced military instructor is provided.


The physical program has been formulated by the Camp staff with fun—clean fun—uppermost. It promotes the joy and satisfaction of achievement. Equally important, it does not overtax the capacities of the individual camper.

At the Howe Summer Camp your boy will have the added advantage of being able to spend a part of his time strengthening his academic background. There is a well-regulated program of study during the morning hours.

Hiking along the trails, nature study, campcraft, the reading of selected books and various hobbies occupy the forenoon hours of those campers not following academic courses.

The moral and spiritual needs of the campers are also adequately met. Each Sunday morning, the campers assemble for worship in the beautiful outdoor chapel, dedicated to St. Francis. Campers who qualify act as servers and make up the Camp choir.

COMFORTABLE QUARTERS FOR
ALL CAMPERS



The Howe Summer Camp is ideally located among thirty acres of woodland on the shores of Cedar Lake (four miles east of the campus of the Howe Military School) at Howe, Indiana.

The lake is large enough to afford campers facilities for water recreation yet small enough to insure a constant supervision of all campers.

A level beach provides an excellent opportunity for camp fires, steak roasts and sport contests. The woodland and surrounding countryside stimulate nature study.

The physical equipment of the Camp consists of nineteen buildings with fifteen cabins, one of which is especially constructed for younger boys. A member of the staff resides in each cabin.

The dining hall and kitchen are in a well constructed building adjacent to the cabins. The drinking water has the approval of the State Board of Health. Three large bath-houses contain showers with hot and cold running water as well as ample toilet facilities. The sanitation is excellent.







Awards are given at the Howe Summer Camp as recognition for worthwhile achievements. Campers work toward standardized goals in twenty-two fields of usual activity under competent instructors. The emblems are within reach of every camper.

Awards are presented

The Academic emblem, granted campers maintaining a "B" average or better, signifies excellence in school work.

Campcraft consists of nature study, woodcraft, knot-tying, bird study and first aid.

The Handicraft Shop is a favorite haunt of boys interested in airplane and boat modeling, leather craft, metal tapping and similar projects.

Daily classes are held in the various aquatic sports. Fundamentals are stressed and awards given for acceptable form in the major strokes and dives. A course in Life Saving and Water Safety is conducted by a capable instructor who has had Red Cross Aquatic School training.

The all-point competition winners in the three age groups, Junior, Intermediate and Senior are presented with trophies at the close of the camp and a medal is given to the campers showing the greatest improvement.

In the afternoons all campers enjoy a schedule of athletics and water sports. There is a swimming class under the guidance of competent instructors in which each camper is taught to be self-reliant and to enjoy water sports. There is a Water Safety instructor on the staff who gives a course in First Aid and conducts tests in water safety. A large percentage of the boys win awards each year. The Red Cross program stresses water safety by teaching fundamental skills in swimming, first aid, boating and canoeing. It is all-inclusive, adapted to all stages from non-swimmers to experts in all forms of aquatics.

Although the camp has no rigid regulations in regard to visiting, there are certain suggestions which, if followed by parents, will be helpful to their camper sons. Three visits a season will aid to keep your son happy. Camp specifically requires that parents refrain from visiting the camp until the end of two full weeks of camping. Visiting is limited to Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon. Parents are cordially invited to view the aquatic exhibitions on Sunday afternoons to see the surprising progress their sons have made.

Each camper becomes a member of one of the many intramural teams. This develops his interest in his group where the competition is keen and the spirit is high—*he belongs.*

There is also instruction in woodcraft, nature study, handicraft and scoutcraft each day. A weekly paper, THE HOWE HERALD, is published to keep the parents and alumni informed of the activities of the Camp.

The camp fires, water carnivals, amateur and stunt nights, Sunday afternoon boat races, swimming and diving meets, steak and marshmallow roasts, canoe trips, cook-outs and no end of special events add zest to the summer's program.

Boy Scouts and Cubs are encouraged to complete

requirements for advancement. There are always a number of Scouts and Cubs in attendance at the Camp.

Riding, which is very popular with the campers, is optional at a cost of \$45.

While members of the staff urge the camper to enter every activity from which he may benefit, a close watch is kept to see that he does not overexert himself or become unduly fatigued.



We seek to enroll boys who will enjoy and profit from a summer spent in the constructive environment of our Camp. With this in mind, only those boys who are in good health and well-adjusted socially, of junior school ages, will be accepted. *Regardless of age, any boy troubled with enuresis will not be admitted.*

A file of data, including the physical examination report and replies from the references given us, will be completed before an applicant's admission is confirmed. Old Campers will be required to submit the report of physical examination but it will not be necessary for them to provide references.

The School reserves the right to make use of any photographs that it may take of a camper in a group or singly in the activities of the Camp. These photographs will be used only in the promotion of the Camp and for general publicity.

The Howe Summer Camp is owned and operated by the Howe Military School, Howe, Indiana. The Fall Term of Howe Military School begins on September 5th, 1968. Complete college preparatory courses are offered and there is a separate Junior School for boys beginning at the sixth grade. 
Each boy brings the following clothing and equipment: 6 single sheets, 3 pillow slips, 2 blankets, 5 pajamas (2 flannel), bathrobe and slippers, 6 bath towels, 6 wash cloths, 12 pairs of white socks, T-shirts and shorts, 2 pairs white gym shoes, raincoat, sweater or jacket, bathing trunks, scout type oxfords, toilet articles, soap and tooth brush

container, 4 pairs blue jeans and 2 laundry bags. All articles must have the boy's name plainly marked on them.

NOTE: All campers should be provided with a small foot locker in which to store their possessions. (Approximate size 18x30x12)

The charge for the session of six weeks is four hundred dollars. This includes room, board, and instruction in all academic and camping activities. Additional charges for uniforms, spending money, hobby kits and other incidentals are estimated at approximately fifty dollars distributed as follows:

An additional deposit of \$27.50 will be made to cover spending money and incidentals such as haircuts, hobbies, and school supplies.

The charge of \$450. is to be paid as follows: (1) \$50. to accompany the application, (2) \$400. on June 15th. A complete accounting will be sent at the end of the Camp.

Riding is optional at a cost of \$45.

The Camp maintains a camp infirmary with a registered nurse in attendance. The school doctor is available on call. The infirmary charge is \$3.00 per day.

An optional insurance program is provided through

the camp to cover infirmary charges at a cost of \$1.25 per week. You may sign up for this on opening day.

Any health care charges not covered by insurance will be added to the camper's bill.

The Howe Summer Camp exercises diligent care for the welfare of each camper; however, it cannot be held responsible for illness or injuries sustained by a camper nor for the loss of personal property.


The camp operates a canteen from which a camper may purchase candy, ice cream and other confections. If any food is sent to a camper it should be limited to fruit and enough sent so that he may share it with his cabin mates. However, with our ample nutritious meals and the canteen, it should not be necessary to supplement the diet in any way.



Location of Howe

From the map one may readily see the central location of Howe Military School. The radius shown is approximately 225 miles. The School is located at the edge of the pleasant village of Howe in LaGrange County, Indiana, midway between LaGrange, Indiana, and Sturgis, Michigan, on Indiana Highway No. 9 which passes directly in front of the School. (Michigan Highway No. 66 becomes Indiana No. 9 at the State Line).

From Chicago, it is but a little over two hours' drive via the Indiana Toll Road—the Howe exit.

Detroit is approximately a three hours' drive from Howe via Interstate Highway No. 94 to Michigan Route 66 to Sturgis, Michigan.

The Indiana Toll Road passes two miles north of the school and provides a speedy route from Chicago and Cleveland.

Fort Wayne and Kalamazoo are each but fifty miles away; while Toledo, Cleveland, Columbus and Cincinnati are not at a great distance.

The New York Central Railroad System passes through Elkhart, Indiana. Bus service both east and west is also available.
